## 7<sup>th</sup> AfrEA Conference Evaluation for Development: From Analysis to Impact

According to the 2012 Millennium Development Goals (MDG) Report of the African Development Bank (AfDB), the quality of social service delivery, inequality, unemployment (particularly among youths), vulnerability to shocks, economic, social and environmental sustainability of performance, and inclusive growth remains recurrent challenges in Africa. This is despite sustained progress toward several MDGs and track records to achieve the targets.

While following that path, policy makers ask numerous questions: what is the most effective intervention in reducing the prevalence of diarrhoea amongst children under five? Is it investing in the supply of safe drinking water, opening access to improved sanitation facilities, hygiene education for households, or a combination of all these? Should we offer subsidies to farmers either in the form of subsidized fertilizers, extension services or cash to boost agricultural production? What to do to significantly reduce poverty in disadvantaged groups of the society? Has the Highly Indebted Poor Countries (HIPC) Initiative reach its target groups? Has it better their condition?

Across previous AfrEA conference, there is definite consensus that building capacity to provide rigorous answers to these policy questions is critical. However, it is even more important to provide *policy makers* with the right skills and ensure they use **evaluative evidence** in making development policies, aimed at improving the day-to-day lives of the millions of people affected by these decisions.

At the 7<sup>th</sup> AfrEA Conference, the international community gathers amidst the presence of parliamentarians and state dignitaries to reflect on the best ways to locate evaluative evidence **at the heart of development policymaking in Africa**. In the context of the above, we hope that this Conference will set the foundation for future AfrEA conference, pushing evaluation at the top of government agendas.

## 7<sup>eme</sup> AfrEA Conférence Évaluation pour le Développement : de l'analyse à l'Impact

D'après le rapport de la Banque africaine du développement (BAD), la qualité de la fourniture des services sociaux, les inégalités, le chômage (chez les jeunes en particulier), la vulnérabilité aux chocs, la durabilité économique, sociale, et environnementale de la performance, et la croissance inclusive restent des défis récurrents en Afrique. Ceci en dépit des progrès réalisés vers l'atteinte de plusieurs cibles des Objectifs Millénaires de Développement (OMD).

En suivant ces objectifs, les décideurs se posent beaucoup de questions : Quelle est l'intervention la plus efficace afin de réduire la prévalence de la diarrhée chez les enfants de moins de 5 ans ? Faut-il investir dans l'adduction d'eau potable, la construction des sanitaires améliorés dans les ménages, l'éducation à l'hygiène domestique, ou une combinaison de toutes ces actions ? Devons nous offrir des subventions aux agriculteurs à travers la fourniture de fertilisants, des services techniques d'accompagnement ou de l'argent pour stimuler la production agricole ? Que faut-il faire afin de réduire considérablement la pauvreté au sein des couches défavorisées de la société ? Est-ce que l'initiative des pays pauvres très endettés, PPTE, a atteint les objectifs visés ? A-t-il amélioré leur condition ?

Les précédentes conférences d'AfrEA sont arrivées à un consensus défini, que le renforcement des capacités en vue de fournir des réponses à ces questions est important. Cependant, il est davantage crucial d'apporter aux décideurs les compétences requises et de s'assurer de l'utilisation de preuves évaluatives dans la prise de décision pour le développement, afin d'améliorer le quotidien des millions de personnes affectées par ces décisions.

Lors de la 7<sup>ème</sup> conférence d'AfrEA, la communauté internationale rassemblée en présence des parlementaires et des dignitaires de l'État afin de réfléchir sur des voies et moyens d'inscrire les constatations évaluatives au cœur du développement. Dans le contexte ci-dessus, nous espérons que cette conférence constituera la base des conférences à venir, en mettant en exergue l'évaluation dans l'agenda gouvernemental.
